Thursday afternoons

Lately we have been recording finds excavated from our highly successful Young Archaeologists' Summer School (photo above). The results will be incorporated into a report covering all the work in numbers 9 and 11 Church Street.

We are also cataloguing our huge collections of artefacts of various sorts so that we know what we have and can use them for further research and teaching. If you are not working Thursday afternoons a very friendly group of people meet in The Old Courthouse between 1.30 and 4pm. No expertise required, we learn from each other and sometimes get in other experts.

THOROTON SOCIETY: GEOFFREY BOND RESEARCH AWARD

We have been successful in obtaining this grant to enable us to get thin section analysis done on some of our pottery. This will enable us to research whether we have a local Medieval pottery type. Watch out for further details.

DIGITAL SOUTHWELL

We are planning an ambitious project to digitise and geolocate artefacts from Southwell onto some kind of app for the community and visitors. We hope to be collaborating with the Local History Society on this. This project is open to anyone who might be interested in researching and learning more about the process and the archaeology. C14 Radiocarbon dating

One of our projects took place in the Vicars' Court precinct; these are buildings that stand as part of the Southwell Minster assemblage and next to a scheduled monument protecting a large and complex Romano-British 'villa' site. A late 7th to 9th century Anglo-Saxon cemetery overlays this site.

Our aim was to try and understand more about the development of the early Vicars' Choral that supported the Minster canons and about the Anglo-Saxon church believed to have pre-dated the Norman Minster. We were successful in obtaining a Community Archaeology Research grant that enabled us to get 2 bone samples dated. 2 cow bones that were found below and alongside this wall structure were sent off and came back with a probable dating of mid-8th to 9th centuries. Very exciting, and of a piece with the Saxon settlement here.



SUPPORT THE MINSTER EDUCATION TEAM -VOLUNTEERING OPPORTUNITY

Some time ago SCAG put together a series of Romans Day activities for the Minster Education team that they have now developed and delivered to thousands of primary school pupils.
